FREDERICK LAW OLMSTED'S DRUID HILLS

Meet Frederick Law Olmsted

In a career spanning half a century, Olmsted designed some of the most celebrated landmarks in the United States, ranging from Central Park in New York and the Emerald Necklace in Boston to the U.S. Capitol Grounds in Washington, D.C. and Jackson Park in Chicago. He is remembered as the preeminent 19th-century landscape architect and founder of the profession, but he was also a multifaceted visionary and social reformer. His experiences as a farmer, journalist for The New York Times, administrator, public servant and health advocate all influenced his later thinking and career.

His sons, Frederick Law Olmsted, Jr. and John Charles Olmsted, followed in his footsteps. Over a period of almost 100 years, the Olmsted firm had nearly 6,000 projects throughout the United States, Canada and other countries.

"The enjoyment of scenery employs the mind without fatigue and yet exercises it; tranquilizes it and yet enlivens it; and thus, through the influences of the mind over the body gives the effect of refreshing rest and reinvigoration to the whole system."

In 1890, Olmsted traveled by train, streetcar and then horseback to reach 1,400 acres of woodland and scrub farmland in Atlanta, GA. There, he envisioned the "ideal residential suburb" with spacious lots along curvilinear streets and a linear park and parkway as the centerpiece of his design.

In the 1980s, the integrity of the Olmsted plan was threatened by a proposed roadway. This launched the neighborhood into a decade-long fight, marked by protests, arrests and court cases, and birthed <u>Olmsted Linear Park Alliance</u>, the organization that continues to steward this Olmsted masterpiece.

A Commitment to Public Health

Frederick Law Olmsted believed parks function as "lungs of the city," offering spaces that foster physical and mental health. He was an early member of the American Public Health Association (APHA) and understood humans' need for access to nature and the critical connection between a thoughtful built environment and social, health and ecological well-being.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the world acknowledged public green spaces as critical health infrastructure. Yet, issues of development and disinvestment still threaten parks and the communities they serve. Data from the Trust for Public Land found that many, including low-income communities and communities of color, face serious barriers when it comes to equal access.

There is still a lot to be done to ensure safe and equitable access to parks and green space for all. That's why we partner with organizations like APHA and continue to bring in practitioners and scholars to discuss these important issues.
